


For serious cliff-top glamour, visit Ayana Resort's multi-platform bar located 14 metres above the roiling ocean. Stroll through a subterranean limestone grotto to a pathway that leads to a secret garden dramatically suspended over a sandy beach. Book the private jetty for a discreet dinner for two.

Observe a Balinese dance at sunset

Set on a cliff-top in southern Bali, The Istana is a cultural destination where traditional performances are staged on the lawn with a purple and pink sunset as the backdrop. Fly over an active volcano














Cycle into the past














The perfect pool in breathtaking mountains
