January–February: Peak snow, peak cool

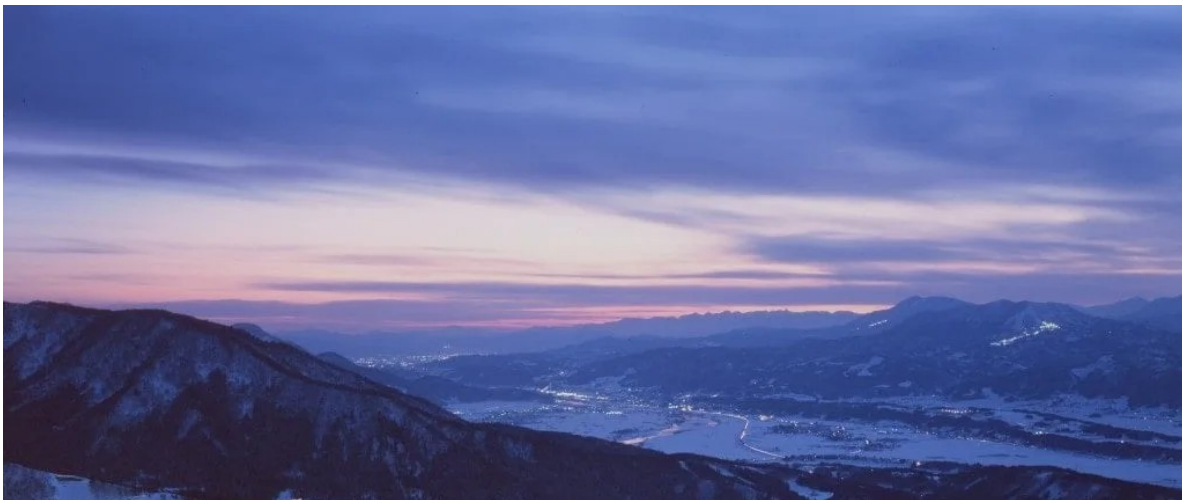
March: Softer snow, fewer crowds, more selfies.
